LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to everyone! Welcome back, to many! It's hard to believe that this organization has been organizing Folk Festivals and related events for 80 years – what a statement about the enduring power of folk traditions. Personally, I'm both proud and awed to have been a part of the journey for 40 years. No matter how long you have been involved, I hope you enjoy it as much as I do. Better yet, find others to share the joy with!

Some people think of NEFFA as similar to "Brigadoon", the enchanted village which reappears magically every year. But it isn't magic. It reflects the hard work of dozens of people who do the heavy lifting (sometimes literally) behind the scenes. I sincerely thank the Committee Chairs and their helpers who make the magic actually happen. Feel free to join me in thanking anyone you meet with a Festival Committee badge!

Larry Jennings was famous for saying that NEFFA changes by "evolution, not revolution". This year, we have added (or brought back) a Family Activities space in the Trade Center, and we have many family-friendly events – you and your children can dance, sing along, act in a mummers' play, or play contra tunes.

We have updated our Code of Conduct to emphasize that the Culture of Consent applies to all NEFFA program spaces. We have come to realize that things do not always go perfectly, and we have created an Incident Response Team which can respond in real time to incidents at the Festival.

As always, we very much welcome your feedback on how we can improve the Festival. Evaluation forms are available at the Information Tables in both the Hotel and Trade Center. In addition, we are trying to build our understanding of the communities we serve, and ask all attendees to complete a separate online Survey this year to help us with this process.

Our Festival might look like just an April event, but in fact, the NEFFA Board meets year-round. The Board is engaged in a multi-year process examining what diversity, equity, and inclusion means for the organization and our events. We sponsor the Thursday Contras series at the Scout House and the Ralph Page Dance Event, a January weekend with a more historical bent. And we always need more help! Stop by the Volunteers' table, or ask anyone with a Festival badge how you can help out.

The lingering effects of the pandemic continue to challenge arts organizations locally and around the world. While NEFFA is fortunate to have significant reserves, we did lose money in 2023, and so we raised ticket prices for the first time since the pandemic. In addition, you are always welcome to earn free admission as a volunteer.

Very few traditional arts events I attend look as full as they did before COVID, and some organizations have not survived. I am personally concerned that it may take many years to recover. I encourage you to participate in as many events as you are able.

I hope to see you singing and dancing sometime soon!

- On the dance floors, please wear only clean, nonmarking shoes that have not been worn outside (such as clean sneakers or soft-soled dance shoes).
- There is no on-street parking associated with the Festival. Please park only in marked spaces in the Hotel or Trade Center lots.
- Park at your own risk. The New England Folk Festival Association (NEFFA), its directors, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees do not assume any liability for any damage, theft or other loss to your vehicle or your property that occurs as a result of parking your vehicle in any of the lots that are designated for Festival use. Observe the designated NEFFA parking signs. NEFFA will not be making announcements about towing.
- For the 2024 NEFFA Festival, vaccination and masking are optional. Please respect everyone's personal choice to mask or not mask. By attending the NEFFA Festival, you are assuming all risk related to exposure to and illness from infectious diseases including but not limited to COVID-19. Attendance is at your own risk.
- Large print grids are available in the Lobby and at the Information Table, both in the Hotel. Please contact Information if you need assistance with access to a program or activity.
- Children must be supervised by a parent or guardian at all times. Events coded F are designed for you and your children to participate in together. We encourage you to put contact information on the back of your children's name badges. Any Festival Committee member who finds a small child alone will bring them to the Information Table to await their parent. NEFFA, its directors, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees do not assume any liability for any injuries to a child sustained

- as a result of parent or guardian's failure to adequately supervise a child at the Festival.
- Questions? Can't find the Morris dancers? Lost your ticket? Need a ride? Want to leave a message for a friend? Ask for help at the Information Table, and we'll do our best to assist you.
- NEFFA encourages all dancers to exercise care in their dancing. NEFFA, its directors, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees do not assume any liability for any injuries that may be sustained due to the condition of the halls or to dancing.
- NEFFA maintains a Lost & Found at the Information Table. Before you leave the Festival, check at the Information Table to report belongings you have mislaid. The item may already be there. If not, and it is found at the close of the Festival, it will be mailed to you, if we have your name and address. If you discover after you leave the Festival that you have lost something, you may email lostandfound@neffa.org to see if the item was found, or visit the Lost & Found page at the NEFFA website to report your missing item. Items not claimed by July 1 will be donated to charity, if appropriate.
- Please watch your personal belongings. NEFFA, its directors, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees do not assume any liability for any damage, theft or loss to your personal property that occurs as a result of attendance at the Festival.
- NEFFA does not permit Festival-goers to bring dogs or other animals into program areas during the Festival, except service animals which are present for the purpose of assisting someone with a disability.

Privacy Statement Our promise to you is that any contact information that we gather from you – performers, volunteers, vendors, members, attendees, etc. is gathered solely for use by NEFFA and will not be shared or sold.

Festival craftspeople, merchants, and those who serve food come at their own expense to share their interests with others. Do consider buying items that are for sale, but remember that the transactions are entirely between you and the vendors.



ROOM CAPACITY

We hope we will have few situations where the number of people wishing to attend an event exceeds the capacity of the space where it is scheduled, but we cannot allow overcrowding in rooms. The capacity of each room is posted outside of each room, and it's possible that a Safety volunteer will need to restrict entrance to a crowded room.

If you are not allowed into an event because the room capacity has been reached, please be understanding and cooperate with our Safety volunteers and NEFFA organizers.

CODE OF CONDUCT

ABOUT NEFFA

We are a diverse community of friendly people who enjoy and promote many folk traditions, including folk dancing and singing. We aim to create inclusive, safe, and welcoming events with your help. Please refer to our Code of Conduct (below) for more information.

NEFFA events run on volunteer energy! Thank you for welcoming new folks, volunteering, and participating in our events. We really appreciate your help!

How to Enjoy Dance Sessions Safely

- Please feel free to join in participatory dance sessions.
- If it's a partner dance, you may ask anyone to dance or anyone may ask you. Either of you can accept or politely refuse. Dancing with different people is a valued tradition, and we encourage you to change partners frequently.
- If you are new, ask experienced dancers to dance with you.
- If you are an experienced dancer, ask someone new or sitting out. You can also help newer dancers with friendly gestures (verbal instructions can be confusing).
- For dances with two roles, when you ask someone to dance, ask if they have a preference. It's okay to switch roles!
- If it's a line dance, ask to break in between people or join at the end of the line. If a dance seems more complicated, try the dance behind the line. Watch the line leader or an experienced dancer to get the steps.
- When turning, eye contact helps avoid dizziness. If it's uncomfortable for you, look at your partner's shoulder, ear or forehead.
- Take care of yourself, and get consent for flourishes or for more energetic dancing. If you have an injury, tell people verbally, or by wearing a brace, bandana, or badge. Here are some examples of things to check in about with your partner:
 - ° "Do you like to twirl?"
 - $^{\circ}\,$ "Do you like to swing fast?"
 - ° "I'm dizzy. Can we slow down?"
 - "My shoulder/wrist/hand hurts. Can we find an easier way to swing/allemande?"
- · Laugh off mistakes, and be patient with yourself and others.

How to Enjoy Folk Music and Song Sessions

- NEFFA encourages a culture of participation as well as performance. Sometimes it can be tricky to see where those lines get drawn, so here are some helpful tips.
- · At the Festival, the program has codes that can help you know what to expect and how to participate.
 - ° Sessions with an E code are Entertainment and you are invited to be a respectful audience. If the performer invites you to sing or play along, by all means do so!
 - ° If a session has a G code, it means Group Participation is welcome. You can expect to bring an instrument, sing along on the chorus, or lead a song at the leader's invitation.
- The leader for a jam session or singalong is responsible for promoting respectful participation. Keep an eye on the leader for guidance.
- Take turns. Make sure everyone has a chance before you lead a second song or tune.
- Listening is as important as singing or playing. Please keep your attention on the session and move side conversations out of the program space.
- If you're leading a song, help to create a welcoming environment. As you are able, we encourage you to avoid or adapt offensive lyrics such as racist or sexist references. Consider the impact of your lyrics on others.

CODE OF CONDUCT

We expect all of our attendees – performers, volunteers, and participants – to respect our **culture of consent**. We all share the responsibility for a satisfying, safe, and successful event. All interactions in NEFFA spaces should be consensual. Please treat everyone with kindness and respect. Be considerate of the physical needs, skill level, and energy of your fellow attendees. We expect everyone to remember and respect that "no" means "no."

We are an **inclusive** event. Think carefully before commenting on a dancer's appearance, ethnic heritage, or any other potentially sensitive topic. If another person's behavior makes you feel uncomfortable or unsafe, please report it to us so we can address the situation.

Parents/guardians are ultimately responsible for the safety and conduct of their children. Young children should be supervised by a parent or another designated adult at all times.

All attendees under the age of 18 are encouraged to provide emergency contact information on the back of their Name Tag badges.

Many of our participants are sensitive to fragrances. Please do your best to avoid scented products.

How do I report a concern?

Please share issues or concerns, particularly regarding unsafe behavior, so we can continue to produce welcoming events.

- At the Festival: The Safety Table can write down a report to be addressed after the Festival. For more urgent concerns, ask anyone wearing a Festival Committee badge, or a person at the Safety or Information Tables, to refer you to a member of our Incident Response Team.
- At non-Festival NEFFA events: If you cannot identify who to talk to, ask the people at the door who the event coordinator is.
- At any time: You can always contact members of the NEFFA Board of Directors using any of the methods on our website at https://www.neffa.org/contacting-neffa-organizers/.

What happens once I report a concern?

We take all reports seriously. Depending on the situation, we may take a variety of actions to respond to violations of our code of conduct, up to and including removing an individual from the Festival or other event.



1978: The Original Series is Born

Dancers in the Boston area are indebted to Tod Whittemore for founding a landmark dance series. Driven by Tod's energy, charisma, and sense of fun infusing the dance, the series became quite popular.

1990: NEFFA Takes on the Dance!

When he decided to stop the dance, Tod had no plans for the future of the series, but it became evident that a small group of dancers wanted to keep the dance alive. In that group were Steve Boylan, Cal Howard, Larry Jennings, Leslie Morrison, Dan Pearl, John Rowen, and Ernie Spence. The committee saw benefit to running the dance under the auspices of a non-profit organization NEFFA. The Thursday Night Dance Committee (TNDC) was formed, with Dan Pearl as Chair, and NEFFA President Lisa Greenleaf as ex officio member.

August 2006: Thursdays move halls

The dance was moved to the Concord Scout House and has continued there till the present time.

TNDC Vision

The committee has strived to provide a fun New Englandstyle dance that features high quality local and touring performers, as well as providing a venue for newer, talented individuals to get some exposure. The all-volunteer TNDC, now consisting of Dereck Kalish, Lisa Greenleaf, Terry Huffaker, Sue Rosen, and Dan Pearl takes an active hand in the conduct of the dance. We strive to offer a dance where all are welcome, and that everyone dances with everyone in all parts of the hall.
